Dear EdCom Members,

EdCom has witnessed a great deal of change in the past few years with both the realignment of the Professional Networks and the reorganization and streamlining of our board structure. Now that the dust has largely settled, the board took a day and a half at our annual winter meeting to assess the progress of our current strategic agenda and the status of our regular programs to refocus the agenda for the coming few years.

The board had a robust and lively discussion and was joined by both AAM president Ford Bell and Elizabeth Merritt from AAM's Center of the Future of Museums. Throughout the meeting, a theme of EdCom's important role in the advancement of museum education standards and best practices and the promotion of "next practices" by our innovative colleagues in the field reoccurred.

This focus of "Best & Next" will be the guiding vision for EdCom in its refreshed strategic agenda. We are developing an action plan that 1) utilizes the new board committee and volunteer structure to gather and share stories from the field and 2) leverages EdCom awards, conference sessions and professional development opportunities to recognize "Best & Next" practices nationally.

# **Regional Update: Midwest**

### **Family Paleontologist Camp**

The Falls of the State Park in Clarksville, Indiana, in partnership with Bellarmine University, offers Family Paleontologist Camp each July. During this three-day career camp, 11 children (ages 12–16) learn about becoming a paleontologist through lessons, field work, collecting, identifying and interpreting fossils. Parents also participate in all activities.

### Inclusive Arts Programs Through The Kennedy Center/VSA Arts

The Dennos Museum Center, under a contract with the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts/VSA Arts Access for Kids, is providing programs for 130 students with disabilities from the Traverse Bay Area Intermediate School District (TBAISD). This program includes an educational performance, a gallery tour and art project, and a storytelling program. An additional 30 general education students will join groups as they explore the exhibition, Art of the Sleeping Bear Dunes: Transforming Nature into Art. Programs will take place October 2013-May 2014.

Deb Nelson of TBAISD states, "The benefits of inclusive, collaborative experiences like this project provides reach beyond the present experience. Students of all abilities experiencing the arts together has the potential of developing healthy communities who appreciate not only the arts but their own diversity."
